
Town Hall Recording: Virtual Town Hall to Bring Community College Community Together

As part of a national initiative to recruit, hire, and retain STEM faculty from underrepresented groups, the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) INCLUDES project, funded by the National Science Foundation, examined university efforts supporting access to, retention in, and progress to the professoriate for URG STEM faculty aspirants. Aspire is one of the initiatives that resulted from this grant. This report details the findings of APLU INCLUDES work thus far.

Productivity and Happiness Under Sustained Disaster Conditions

By now, many people are slowly coming to terms with the idea that the Covid-19 crisis may continue for months and create a radically changed world. That realization is understandably distressing, given the prospect of prolonged physical distancing, rising death tolls, and serious economic decline. As the denial fades, fear and anger take its place, which can result in emotional and intellectual paralysis.



The prospect of an enduring crisis is frightening. But as someone who has lived and worked in disaster conditions in other contexts, I can assure those of you new to crises that this initial wave of acute distress is temporary. How you feel today is not how you will feel in a month, or a year — even if the crisis continues. At this early stage, all we can see are the walls, the restrictions, the losses. But there is light between those walls.

'The Six' Ask Colleges for Clarity, Flexibility on Grades and Credit Transfer

As colleges and universities set policies on how they will handle grades and college credits resulting from program changes prompted by the current health crisis, the nation's six major higher education organizations — including the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) — have drafted "common principles" that institutions should keep in mind when developing those policies.

"The Six" have outlined eight principles to guide colleges on addressing grades and credits, noting that higher education institutions should address these issues as soon as possible.

On Wednesday morning, Los Angeles Trade Technical College student Milagro Jones logged onto his laptop from a one-bedroom apartment in south Los Angeles to attend an online class on human evolution. His 5-year-old daughter, Lydia, at home from preschool, played nearby.



This was supposed to be the first day of online courses after the Los Angeles

Community College District announced it would suspend most in-person classes due to the novel coronavirus.

To Jones' surprise, nobody else — not even the teacher — was online.

How to Recover the Joy of Teaching After an Online Pivot

Author Flower Darby writes: "I clearly remember the immediate frenzy of activity that followed my father-in-law's death from cancer at age 49. We were devastated by the loss, but we were so busy that we didn't feel the deep and lasting pain until later, when the funeral was over and the out-of-town guests had gone. I expect something similar to happen with the Great Pivot Online Crisis of 2020.

In the first few weeks of the pandemic, a lot of faculty members were rushing out of their comfort zone, moving their face-to-face courses online, and figuring out how to teach from home with kids and pets. As head of a teaching center on my campus, I am seeing many of my earnest colleagues overcome their nerves and experiment with unfamiliar modes of instruction. They are excitedly posting their first attempts at recording mini-video lectures and drafting syllabus statements of flexibility and support for students."

Pullias Team Addresses Biases and Discrimination Hiding in Letters of Recommendation

Letters of recommendation are used in admissions and hiring to glean information and qualities which may go unnoticed in the review of an applicant's file. However, they are also one of the most common places that bias is written into applicant records—sometimes in subtle ways.

The Pullias Center's Julie Posselt, Steve Desir, and Román Liera are leading an effort to shine a light on this typically unrecognized source of bias that has the power to shape the careers of graduates and other applicants looking to enter or advance in the workforce.
