- Take care of yourself and your loved ones. The first step to being a supportive and caring teacher is to taking care of yourself. I have included some articles on mental health and well-being to hopefully help with the sense of isolation that may arise from social distancing.
- **Be patient.** Technology will inevitably go awry. That's okay! Don't panic, this is not going to be perfect. Try to let your students know that this is normal and that they should be patient too.
- **Be transparent.** This is going to be a big change not only for you but also for your students. Explain that things will be difficult at first and that you are struggling with them and won't have all the answers.
- Be empathetic and compassionate. Many of your students may be struggling with other challenges outside of class. Many may not have access to technology or internet. Leniency and understanding may be warranted more than in normal class situations. Being aware of the resources available to your students may also help.
- Look to your campus community for support. This type of work can be isolating but don't forget, we are all in this together! No one has all the answers, but we all have our areas of expertise. Reach out to your colleagues and friends to help support you and look to the many resources that are available to help you work through whatever challenges you may be encountering.
- Think positive. Treat this as a learning experience. Now the best time to activate your growth mindset.

When Berea College sent out a campuswide email at midday on Tuesday, announcing that it would end in-person instruction and send students home for the rest of the semester because of concerns about the coronavirus, the dining hall erupted in cheers. But quickly the students turned solemn, worried, even a little panicky, said Brady Willis, a sophomore from Northern California. Willis's roommate tried to figure out if he had enough gas money to drive from the Kentucky college back home to Georgia. A group of



enough gas money to drive from the Kentucky college back home to Georgia. A group of students began to pool money to rent a storage locker, \$20 here, \$25 there. Another wondered where he'd find a job to help his family pay for the extra two months of groceries they'd have to buy when he returned home.

"It's been a roller coaster of emotions," said Willis, the student-body vice president, late Tuesday night.

Online Peer-to-Peer Assessment Applications

Last month's Scientific Teaching in Practice webinar speaker, Jennifer Knight, discussed practical assessment strategies and tools for use in active classrooms. Here are some recommended resources for online peer-to-peer assessment and review applications:

- <u>CATME</u>- a system of secure, web-based tools that enable instructors to implement best practices in managing student teams.
- <u>TEAMMATES:</u> designed by a team of teachers and students, for teachers and students. It aims to provide a
 powerful peer feedback and peer evaluations mechanism with flexibility.
- <u>iPeer:</u> an open source web application that allows instructors to develop and deliver rubric-basedpeer
 evaluations, to review and release student comments, to build progress report forms online, and to analyze
 evaluation results.

LEARN MORE ABOUT WHAT WE DO


